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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Kaamadhenu Arts and Science College is a co-educational institution run by Kamadhenu Educational and Charitable Trust with the primary intention of uplifting the rural students. The institution is affiliated to Bharathiar University established in the year 2001 at Sathyamangalam, Erode District and is included under section 2(f) & 12(B) of the UGC Act 1956 and certified with ISO 21001:2018 quality policy. The Chairman of the institution is a well known agriculturalist Shri. R.Perumalsamy, whose contribution to the society and education is immense. The institution is not only his brain child, but also an instrument that can transform the lives of rural and semi urban societies.

Having 'Initiate the Innovation' as the motto, the institution has set its objectives and works towards educational excellence. The college offers 14 UG programmes and 5 PG programmes, 6 M.Phil and 4 Ph.D research programmes in Tamil, Commerce, Computer Science and Management with well supported infrastructure.

The institution consistently centres on the comprehensive improvement of the students by involving them in extension activities, community services and maintenance of academic records. students are given full freedom coupled with discipline and responsibility. The college has taken many initiatives for the growth of the students and efforts are being taken to preserve the joy of learning with successful academic achievements. The cordial relationship between the management, faculty members, administrative staff and the students as well as their shared dedication to maintain and enhance quality in higher education brought about the accomplishment of the institution in its endeavours.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution follows the curriculum designed by Bharathiar University, Coimbatore and adopts various innovative methods and procedures to impart knowledge to the young minds. Every department takes responsibility for effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum. They have internal systems for workload allocation, conducting internal examinations and reviewing student performance. Departments maintain a work diary which contains plans to be executed for their students. Staff prepares semester plans, lecture plans and the subject to be taught in every lecture. Academic calendar is prepared and implemented as per the guidelines of the university. Various value added courses and add on courses are offered by the institution to improve life skills of the students. They also get experiential learning through field visits, projects and internships. The value based education courses like Environmental studies, Human Rights and Women's Rights are incorporated in the syllabus which helps the students to care for their society and surroundings. Feedback is collected regularly, analysed and corrective steps are taken to improve teaching learning process.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution follows university rules and regulations for admissions to all departments and seats filled as per reservation policy. The management is very keen on knowledge development of teachers through periodical workshops and FDPs and insists on their update of latest teaching techniques. Classes are handled according to the teacher's lesson plan. LCD projectors are effectively used in the classrooms along with other student centric teaching methods. The learning levels of the students are assessed regularly with continuous cycle tests and implementation of corrective actions. Special efforts taken to increase progression of students and increase pass percentage. The advanced learners are motivated to work for achieving higher goals and for taking additional responsibilities in various activities. Remedial classes conducted for slow learners to improve their performances. To achieve programme outcomes (POs) and course outcomes (COs), teaching strategies, methodologies and evaluation process are framed and outcomes are calculated based on the student's performance in different assessments. Grievances are given attention by well-defined procedure. For further planning and execution, the evaluations and stakeholders feedbacks are analyzed and reviewed.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution is constantly striving to improve research at institutional level. Entrepreneurship Development Cell helps students to improve their entrepreneurial skills. Marketing expo is organized by the management department to make the students learn marketing. The Research and Development cell and IPR cell organises several conferences, seminars, webinars and workshops etc., to improve the quality of research and inculcate professional ethics among students. As a part of their curriculum, students of english, computer science, commerce and management stream have to undertake research projects under the guidance of their teachers. The clubs and cells of the institution has rendered several extension and outreach activities in the neighborhood community in collaboration with government and NGOs to create awareness about social issues as well as to promote the holistic development of the society. The activities include environmental conservation, health,

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cleanliness, voter awareness, road safety etc. Apart from these students have extended their support in blood donation and flood relief materials. The institute has collaborations and linkages with industries for internship and project work.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution has excellent and well-maintained infrastructure facilities for teaching, learning and research environment. The college building has been expanded since the inception and now there are ICT enabled classrooms, laboratories, auditorium, seminar hall, assembly hall. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled, with CCTV cameras. The library contains well stocked books, reading hall, reference room and digital library. All the faculty and students are provided login access for e-resources available under N-list and DELNET. The campus is equipped with student support facilities such as hostel, transport, canteen, RO water, play ground, multipurpose synthetic court, photocopy center, ATM and gym. The college also maintains safety standards and provides safety equipment such as fire extinguishers. The campus has generator, adequate power backup and UPS facilities. The institute has updated its IT facilities with increasing the number of computers, printers, scanners, LCD projectors, photocopy machines and online admission process. The IT policy ensures adequate user-friendly deployment of technology and its maintenance by internal IT team. The management has been spending considerable amount each year to develop and maintain the infrastructure and ensures its optimal utilization.

Student Support and Progression

To support the education of rural students, the college provides facility for them to get the scholarship from the government and management. In addition to the co-curricular activities, departments, associations and committees in the college has initiated some capability enhancement activities like soft skills, yoga, communication skills, etc. The placement cell communicates and coordinates with different industries, identify the native of openings, train the students to offer placement. Outgoing students are encouraged to continue their higher education or get placed in the private and government sectors at different levels. The committees like Anti Ragging Committee, Internal Complaints Committee, Discipline Committee and Grievance Redressal Committee are at place in the institute to address grievances and any complaint regarding misbehaviour. Women empowerment cell provides care and support for female students. Cultural and sports events are conducted frequently inside the campus to create appropriate platform for the students to exhibit their talents. The Fine arts & cultural club and physical education department motivates the students to participate in cultural events and sports activities at regional, university and intercollegiate competitions. The college has registered Alumni Association to strengthen ties between alumni and the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision and mission of the institution is attained through excellent governance, leadership and management. The institution has a structured organizational hierarchy to provide quality education to the rural backward students. The College Committee is a statutory body that identifies new vistas and avenue for progress of the institution, suggestions and plans for various developmental measures, and reviews the progress attained at intervals. The IQAC monitors overall activities of the college regularly. The principal along with IQAC and faculty prepares the plan for quality enhancement and augmentation of infrastructural facilities and submits to the department for further implementation. Appropriate measures are taken to ensure the welfare of all the

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teaching and non-teaching staffs. The college provides financial support to the faculty to attend conferences, seminars and trainings. Internal and external audits are conducted regularly. IQAC takes initiatives not only for the assessment but also improvement of teaching-learning process and student oriented activities through the departments and associations. It ensures feedback from all stakeholders, analyses it and suggests improvement measures.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Gender sensitization and awareness programmes are conducted to create awareness of gender equality. The institution has established facilities for alternate sources of energy such as solar energy, sensor-based energy conservation and use of LED bulbs. There are water conservation facilities in the campus like rain water harvesting and borewell. Institution is landscaped with trees and plants. Green audit, environment audit and energy audit has been conducted by external agencies and the institute has received recognition for its green campus. The college facilitates differently-abled students by providing ramps, wheel chairs, disabled-friendly washrooms and scribes for examination. Activities and programmes pertaining to cultural, regional, linguistic and socio-economic occasions are organized. Days of National and International importance like Gandhi jayanti, Youth day, Independence day, Republic day and International women's day are celebrated every year to foster the spirit of patriotism and harmony. The best practices of the college are green initiatives and ERP implementation. Distinctiveness is focused on developing students talent and ability with concrete efforts, which can impact their lives.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The institution is affiliated and provides credit based courses and value added education prescribed by the university towards the attainment of holistic and multidisciplinary education. The students are encouraged to take up multidisciplinary approach to learning and creative thinking at every stage of the programme. The institution offers various add-on, certificate and value added courses to encourage interdisciplinary learning.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	As the institution follows CBCS design, academic bank of credit is available to the students. The assessment criteria established by the affiliating university is strictly followed for both internal and

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	external assessments. The institution encourages the faculty and students to learn online courses SWAYAM, NPTEL and IIT Spoken Tutorial to earn credits.
3. Skill development:	The Institution is conducting skill courses through CBCS as designed by affiliating university system for all the programmes. Sessions on yoga, soft skills, health and other topics aid in the development of necessary skill sets in the students. Skill enhancement programmes such as industrial visits, certificate courses, workshops etc. are organized by individual departments to develop the skills and competencies throughout the study period to increase employability and self-employment.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The courses are taught in bilingual mode Tamil and English for the understanding of the subject. Tamil as a regional language, it is offered as ability enhancement compulsory courses for undergraduate students. Option is provided on the interest of students to take Kannada or Hindi for Tamil paper. Indian arts, culture and tradition are encouraged through cultural activities and programmes with experts to emphasise Indian knowledge system.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The institution has implemented outcome based education. Faculty are given training to implement OBE in their teaching. The departments follow POs and COs and prepare course plan. The students are briefed about the same during the orientation and by the faculty during regular academic classes. The faculty takes care to access the students on the outcome being achieved at the end of the programme.
6. Distance education/online education:	All faculty and students are well equipped and aware of online teaching learning technology as it was successfully implemented during Covid 19 pandemic. The institution has necessary technology and infrastructure facilities such as classrooms with projectors, free internet and learning management system to support the delivery of online education. Econtent is prepared by the faculty and the same is uploaded in the website. An adequate number of computers are available in the digital library where students can access digital contents.

The institution is affiliated to Bharathiar University and follows the curriculum framed by the university. The university frequently revises and updates the curriculum from time to time and the institute implements them accordingly.

Curriculum Analysis

Curriculum analysis consists of course plan and execution. It is implemented through adherence to academic calendar, course allocation and course file preparation, and implementation process.

Adherence to Academic Calendar

Academic calendar is prepared in accordance with university guidelines. It is uploaded in the college website for the observance of faculty and students. It includes day order, working days, internal examination, tentative schedule of university examinations, academic and non academic activities, list of holidays and other information. It serves as a guide to carry out institution's yearly activities.

Course Allocation and File Preparation

Head of the departments conducts meeting with their faculty members every academic year to plan the activity calendar. Time table is prepared well in advance before the beginning of the semester, based on the subject knowledge, area of interest and experience of the faculty, course is allocated by the HoD and ensures the completion of courses in given time. Course file is prepared by the subject faculty before the commencement of classes that contains syllabus, assignment topics, seminar topics, subject notes, internal assessment, PPT presentation, multiple choice questions, google class rooms etc.

Teaching Learning Resources

During Covid-19 pandemic curriculum is delivered using online platforms like google meet and shared materials using whatsapp groups and google classrooms, now it is regular practice of using ICT tools as teaching aid for effective teaching learning process. The library is equipped with adequate books, e resources N-List and DELNET which helps students to strengthen the learning process.

Implementation Process

Induction program is conducted for the newly enrolled students at the starting of the first semester which helps them to familiarise with the important features of the higher education system, the functioning of the college and adherence to institutional rules.


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Bridge course is offered at the beginning of first year to fill the subject knowledge gaps and short term courses for the interested students to enhance the needed skills. Apart from regular teaching, experiential learning is facilitated through internships, projects, field trips and industrial visits. 
Human Values

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

The institution is committed towards holistic development of students through Student-Centred-Learning Process. Each and every department adopts various strategies for the programmes to make learning more students centric. The institute is well equipped with ICT enabled classes. Teaching with ICT tools, educational videos and access of non print materials enables students to understand the lessons better. The visual interpretation stimulates and motivates students to feel the concepts. Google class room assignments and test, LCD projectors, PPT presentation, smart classes, computer lab with internet facilities and lesson plans posted in camps software are ICT enabled tools that enhance effective mode of communication. Students can view PPT, class notes and materials in ERP. The faculty members upload lectures in the youtube which helps the students to revise the topic. Students adapt themselves to the emerging educational trends.

Experiential Learning

Students are engaged in learning process through reflection on doing. Internships, service learning, student teaching and volunteering examines the actions and their thought processes along with their emotional responses.

Participative Learning



2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The academic calendar with all details is posted on the website well in advance. Exam cell comprising cocoordinator with faculty members conducts examination as well as handles the issues in evaluation process. Students are intimated initially about the examinations during the induction programme by the principal

Internal Exams

The syllabus for the internal examination is informed by the concerned faculty during their classes. Internal assessment time table is prepared in advance, displayed in the notice board and the same is communicated to the students. For every semester two internal examinations and one model examination are conducted, if any discrepancy, the concerned faculty members would resolve it for the corrections brought out by the students. Remedial classes are conducted for the students who failed or scored less in the examination. The department conducts re-examination by the approval of principal for the absentees and for the students involved in co-curricular, extracurricular, sports events during internal examination schedule and for failed students.

The internal marks are displayed on the notice board and student ERP portal. The performance of the students is communicated to the parents. The students are guided to improve their future performances. Theory and practical examinations are conducted and awarded marks by adopting Continuance Internal Assessment (CIA) as per the guidelines framed by the Bharathiar University. The semester end examinations are conducted by the affiliating university. The CIA is given a weightage of 25% for core and electives, and for skill-based courses it is 20% (Upto 2021 Batch). The weightage has been revised as 50% for core and electives and 30% for skill based from 2021-22 Batch.

External Exams


The college provides the necessary infrastructure and faculty support for the exams even though it has no part in determining the timetable and procedures of the university exams. The university circulars and time table are displayed in the notice board. After the evaluation the results are declared in the university website. If students have grievances regarding the result, exam cell supports for reevaluation, rechecking and getting answer sheet. Besides the above, if any issues related to examination and evaluation, principal express his views to controller of examination of university.

Redressal of Grievances at the Institutional level

Grievances of students related to the examinations are solved through class tutor and HoD. The grievances represented to class advisors gets rectified with intimation to HoD. Students are given training well in advance about the do's and don'ts during the semester exam.

Redressal of Grievances related to University exams

Grievance regarding semester examinations such as questions from out of syllabus, change in question paper pattern are communicated to university through Principal. Other related queries like, corrections in mark sheets, change or absence of subject code in the student hall ticket are informed on time to university.


Response:

The curriculum of the programme is designed by the Bharathiar University. The objective of each subject is spelt out in the syllabus prescribed by the university from the academic year 2020-21. The Board of studies of university has defined the programme outcomes (POs) for each programme offered by the colleges. It also describes programme specific outcomes (PSOs) and course outcomes (COs).

Programme outcomes are well illustrated as to impart quality education to both undergraduate and postgraduate students. The students are informed about these outcomes in the induction meeting by the principal and respective department heads. The programme outcome is also stated and displayed on the college website. Following the effective pedagogic strategies, the faculty articulates the learning objectives and expected outcomes for each course at the beginning of the session as well as before each unit in the syllabus. This helps the student to be aware of the topic being covered in class and they observe the relevance in the topic and knowledge.

Programme specific outcomes are closely related to the content of the syllabus. There are some universal learning outcomes also which are inherited in every syllabus. The students are encouraged, guided to learn and imbibe these outcomes. They are also percolated through organization and participation of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The assessment of students in the light of POs, PSOs and COs is done regularly that help our faculty to know the students understanding on the various topics present in the course. It also provides feedback to the faculty and benefit in improving the teaching learning process. Alumnae of various departments are invited to interact with both the students and teachers during the alumni meet and at other events and meetings. They share their views and experiences how the different courses shaped their careers. IQAC reviews the teaching-learning and assessment process.




Plan: Various outcomes are defined and a correlation is established between outcomes and tools used. A mapping matrix is prepared in this regard for every CO, PO and PSO in the programme including the elective subjects.

Do : An individual faculty member use different direct tools like Class Tests, University Exam, Assignments, Seminars, Projects etc., for the evaluation of Course outcomes (COs). Principal evaluates POs and PSOs by using evaluation of COs and Indirect Tools like Surveys/feedback from Alumni, Employer, Parents, Teachers and Students etc.

Check: Attainment of all outcomes are calculated and compared with expected level of attainment decided by subject teacher for COs and Principal for POs, PSOs and PEOs.

Act: If attainment was up to the expectation then appreciation is extended to the concerned faculty member and in case of deviation from the expected attainment of outcome necessary corrective actions are initiated to improve the outcome as per expectations.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Research and Development Cell

Multiple camps on Entrepreneurship Awareness programme sponsored by the Department of Science and Technology (DST) was conducted for the benefit of non commerce students. The cell creates awareness among students regarding various spheres of entrepreneurship while emphasizing the advantages of studying to build a career. The departments also invite entrepreneurs to share their experience and knowledge on start-ups and the support provided by the government for starting new business. They do organize workshops on jewel making, bag making, painting, repairing and servicing of home appliances etc. to start a business for successful career.

Certificate Courses

Add on courses, industry centric value added courses along with placement and training programmes have been organized by the institution for the benefit of the students. Inorder to instill confidence among the students to start their own venture the institute conducts numerous seminars and training programmes with industry experts.

Career Guidance

The Institute had signed MoU with ICT academy which helps collaborate with Industry experts. Many training programmes have been conducted with ICT to cover the skill Gap among students. Several seminars on career guidance as well as workshops are being conducted regularly to keep the students motivated and help them understand the industry requirements.


Intellectual Property Rights Cell

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The institute has been organizing extension activities and outreach programmes in the neighbourhood community to sensitize the students of the college and assure their social and holistic development along with the academic excellence. Activities are organized through the following clubs NSS, RRC, Rotaract, YRC, Eco club, Unnat Bharath Abhiyan and various academic departments of the institute.

General Awareness Programmes

Public Services


Students are involved in social service by means of managing crowd and hundial coin counting at temples,



4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 Availability of adequate infrastructure and physical facilities viz., classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities, cultural activities, gymnasium, yoga centre etc. in the institution

Response:

The institution is a lush green campus sprawling over 15.28 acres with built up area of 118000 sq ft located at the foothills of Kambathrayan hills. It is a vibrant institute for higher education with spectacular infrastructure.

Teaching Learning Facilities

The institution has well-furnished, spacious, ventilated 55 classrooms which are also well illuminated. The academic and administrative blocks are equipped with Wi-Fi facility to enable effective teaching learning experience. Each of the 10 departments have separate rooms for the faculty members with desktop computers and printers.

Laboratories

The institution has 5 well lit computer laboratories with 300 computers connected with 100 Mbps bandwidth internet facility. Physics lab and chemistry lab has well-maintained equipments to conduct experiments. CDF students are facilitated with sewing lab and processing lab adhering safety features.

Seminar Hall and Auditorium

The college has state of the art conference room, well equipped seminar hall with 350+ seating capacity and an auditorium that can accommodate 3000+ students. The institute also has an open air auditorium (assembly hall) to conduct cultural and sporting events.

Library

A 10000 sq ft library with internet facility is neatly stocked and well organized with books, the reading hall can accommodate 100 students and the library also features a separate reference section. An open desk digital library with 24 computers enables students and faculty members to remote access N List and DELNET e-journals.

IQAC Room

A spacious IQAC room is equipped with 5 computers, projector and 1 multifunctional network printer.

Placement Facility

The Placement and Training Cell feature group discussion and interview panel rooms. Two training rooms with ICT facility are exclusively available for skill training.

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Office

Well furnished office with separate work space for each faculty with computers having internet access.

Sports

The institution has a playground measuring close to 45000 sq ft and indoor facilities for conducting sports and games. The college has multipurpose synthetic court for playing volleyball and tennis.

Cultural Activities

Fine Arts & Cultural Club conducts competitions on special occasions. The departments also organise cultural events on special occasions. The interdepartmental competition 'Sparx' is conducted annually, students are encouraged to participate in various cultural activities to facilitate all-round development.

Yoga and Fitness Center

Yoga practice sessions are organised at regular intervals by Yoga and Meditation Club in association with yoga centres. The institution has a well-equipped fitness centre for students and faculty.

Transport and Hostel

The institution offers transportation for students and faculty with 18 buses having GPS monitoring facility. Separate hostel for boys and girls are available within the campus.

Parking

Separate covered parking is available for faculty and students.


CCTV Surveillance

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), subscription to eresources, amount spent on purchase of books, journals and per day usage of library

Response:

The institution has well equipped, spacious library with rich collection of books, national, international journals, periodicals and magazines both printed and e-copies. To upgrade the library facilities and to make available the recent literature to students and staff, the college purchases books each year. The library has textbooks for issue and reference, competitive examination books, general knowledge books, novels which help students develop, all-round personalities. Old question papers of the university are also available to the students. Students are taken to book exhibitions annually to create interest in reading.

Library Automation

In view of the problems encountered during manual handling of library facilities, it was decided to automate the entire library system by using CampusStack software. All the books are bar-coded and bar-code laser scanners are utilized in circulation counter for book transactions. OPAC allows users to browse the entire library collection and provides the search facilities by author, title, subject, keyword etc. to know the availability of library documents and to save the time of the user. The library module helps to generate and print more number of reports like library book details, user in/out, books issued and return reports, book reports categorized by accession number, book allocation and individual student book circulation report.

ICT Academy

Our college is an institutional member of ICT Academy. The faculty members and students can access ICT Academy journals.

Subscription to E-resources

Digital Library has 24 computers with internet access with a speed of 100 Mbps is an additional facility for the benefit of the students. The library has active subscription of DELNET and Inflibnet N-List which provides access to e-journals, e-books on various subjects. The library has installed Braille blaster software for visually impaired students.

Per day Usage of Library



Alumni represent in IQAC and provide valuable suggestions to improve the institution in all aspects.


Alumni Participation in Extension Activities




The performance appraisal system consists of the following parameters

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Response:

Kaamadhenu Arts and Science College is a self-financed institution run by Kamadhenu Educational and Charitable Trust. The institution takes the traditional footsteps to mop up the financial resources of the system.

Mobilization of Funds

Every year the principal holds a meeting with heads of the departments, committee members and librarian to submit the expected expenditure for the financial year. The budget for the furniture, maintenance of buses, and purchase of equipment are prepared by administrative office. The fee payment of the students is the main source of financial mobilization and all the academic expenses are met with the same. In addition to the fee payment, the management uses its own funds to prop up the infrastructural facilities. The fee collected as tuition fees, bus fees, hostel fees and mess fees are used for the intended purpose. Efforts have been taken up for mobilization of resources through grants and other aids. All the resources are pooled in a single box and thereafter assigned optimally for various projects.

The principal prepares the proposed expenditure for maintenance of infrastructure, developing academic and physical facilities and other initiatives annually. The institution conducts regular internal and external audits on a continuous basis. It helps to know the current financial position of the college with which further plans are executed.

Internal Audit


All the transactions of the college are audited by the internal auditor on regular basis. The team performs the task of internal audit to counter check the utilization of external resources granted to the respective departments. External Audit

He vouches all receipts and payments and provides the balance sheet at the end of the financial year. 
IQAC Institutional Review System

3. The Context:

ERP system encourages open communication, information exchange, and integration for increased productivity and efficiencies. Rapid technological advancement has made it possible for information to be exchanged quickly, effectively, and transparently. More academic and administrative procedures are engaged in ERP from student admission to degree completion. The computerization and management of processes like registration, admission, student information, classes, timetables, e-content, transportation, attendance, libraries and expenses, exams, performance, results, hostels, and reports are just a few of the requirements that educational institutions must adhere to. These requirements are carried out with the help of ERP system. E-governance in our college applied for academics and administration since 2010. Data generation, storage, and retrieval are more time-consuming and less accurate when done manually. To rectify these problems E- Governance is the only possible method.

4. The Practice:

E-Governance in Admission The ERP is having the admission module in which all the admission related processes are stored and retrieved. On line application reduces the paperwork and enhances the clarity and accuracy.

E-based Teaching and Learning The way education is currently delivered relies on e-learning technology, which gives lecturers access to ICT-based teaching aids. The online approaches allow for more efficient instruction and provide a number of benefits over conventional teaching techniques. Technology-based environments like LCD projectors, video courses, and video conferencing have made this possible. Discussions in the classroom are supported by smart lectures, virtual lectures, e-libraries, and an e-learning environment. Google Classroom is also blended online learning platform.

Webinars provide a flexible, convenient, and efficient learning environment. It is the interactive online delivery of seminars, presentations, or other similar content utilising video technology, allowing two-way conversation between the organizer and the other participants.

Online Classes when the offline classes abruptly stopped owing to the pandemic because of our preparedness with G suite institutional mail Id, the staff and students of our college were ready to adapt the online classes without any hindrance.

Resource Management System The goal is to streamline the approval and processing of leave applications. The effective use of the system is promoted among stakeholders through an awareness drive and campaign. Bio metric facility is also available to monitor the entry and exit of the staff members.

E-Services In all levels, e-governance is introduced. Institute has a well-designed ERP called CampusStack, through which the information about the students, faculty are stored in the ERP software and reused whenever required. E-governance in our institution allows use of technologies with the aim of improving education, training and information to encourage student participation in the decision making process, making administration transparent and effective.

5. Evidence of Success:



Many students are not provided with the high bandwidth or the vigorous internet connection that online courses require, and thus fail to catch up egovernance.

- Insist students and neighbourhood community towards the necessity of preservation of ecosystem.

3. The Context:

The institution is situated near Sathyamangalam Tiger Reserve. This mountain range forest is one of hotspot for plants and animals biodiversity. Green is a symbol of fertility and institution is taking utmost efforts to plant new saplings inside the campus and nearby villages. The faculty and students are

committed to maintain the health and biodiversity of the campus that eventually protect our environment. Clean and green environment, provides an eco-friendly atmosphere that promotes effective learning and positive effect on human health.

4. The Practice:

Policies The institution framed policies and implemented it related to Green campus and Environmental, Energy conservation, Waste management and Water resource management.

Plastic Free Campus Use of paper cups and plates is encouraged. Plastic bags and plastic tea cups are banned inside the campus.

E-waste Management E-waste is collected and stored for secured disposal.

Water Resource Management The highlight of the practice is monitoring water levels in tanks and bunds at regular intervals. Borewell recharge pits and tanks are constructed for harvesting the rainwater. Waste water is used for gardening.

Energy Conservation The college is using renewable natural energy like solar energy. LED bulbs and sensor lights are installed.

Clean and Green Initiatives Our sincere effort for reducing carbon emission includes sapling plantation, segregation of biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes, Students and staff members residing nearby are encouraged to use bicycle and public transport for commute to college.

Naming Plants The plants and trees in the campus are labeled and QR coding is done which provides botanical name, common name with additional information.

Miyawaki Forest This plantation designed on the Japanese Miyawaki methodology in which varied plants are rooted at close quarters to improve the green line in the campus. The outcome of this method is achieved in November 2019 through planting approximately 1420 trees of various native trees like Bamboo, Kumil, Mango, Neem, Sacred Fig, coconut etc. in an area of 2800 Sq.M by the student volunteers. This significant deed is proved their curiosity on green revolution.

Garden variety Garden formation such as Natchatra, Navagraha, Herbal benefits the health and wellness. Butterfly and Hibiscus created to enrich the campus with colorful flowers.

Celebrations Various important days environment day, water day, forest day, pollution control day are celebrated. Students participate in the competitions organized related to environment.

Activities by Clubs NSS units of our college have succeeded in fostering sapling plantation culture and maintaining clean environment through extension activities. Eco club in association with Forest Department, Sathy to sensitize the students has actively involved in various eco-friendly programmes including rally to conserve wild life, ban plastic, forest cleaning activity and events. Eco club has also signed MoU with NGOs like Pasumai Thaayagam, Ithal Trust, and SUDAR. College supports Uyirin Swasam Trust in taking care of saplings and distributing it to the society in achieving their dream of planting 200000000 by 2024.

5. Evidence of Success:

The Green campus initiatives are not only adds the beauty of the campus but also it saves the environment. This practice has resulted in the improved quality of air and subsequently quality of life. It may provide cheerfulness and zealous to the staff and students to achieve their goal in the pleasant atmosphere. This

green cover also helped in the examination results of students as increase in overall pass percentage. The college has robust rain water harvesting mechanism that has resulted in the rise in ground water levels of bore wells on the campus. Now the campus could attract varieties of birds, bees, flies, wasps, butterflies, and moths. The institution has received award for maintaining green campus from Nature Science Foundation. The fallen leaves are accumulated to decompose in a pit to manure the garden. Coconut and areca trees in the campus generate revenue which helps in maintaining the garden.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources required:

Encouraging and maintaining the involvement of volunteers is an issue which requires careful guidance. Continuous efforts have been taken to create awareness among faculty and students towards promoting environmental consciousness. Programmes with external agencies should be regularly organized to let people of the surrounding learn the necessity of environment cleanliness and up gradation.

The college is eatablished in the year 2001 as the first arts and science co-educational institution in Sathyamangalam. Most of our students are first generation learners of rural areas. The integrated life skill development activities mainly focus on connecting students, allowing them to participate in relevant and meaningful activities that are applicable to real life. The goal of this approach is to create well-rounded individuals who are equipped with not only the knowledge and technical skills required for their chosen careers, but also the ability to navigate social and ethical situations in a responsible and respectful manner. It helps individuals to understand their roles in their communities and wider world and to equip them with the tools to make positive contributions to society and succeed in professional growth.

To develop skills and competencies the following forms of instructional initiatives are taken,

Promoting Academic and Professional Talents Efforts taken in this context to develop the life skills of the students such as critical thinking, problem-solving, decision-making, communication, self-awareness, self-care, stress management, time management, technical training session, teamwork, internship training and field visit.

Inculcating Leadership Skills All the students are given equal opportunities in the cells and committees. They serve as leaders of the clubs which instill confidence and leadership qualities.

Exhibiting Creativity Exhibitions like science, business to business, B2B, marketing expo, traditional food, consumer, software and hardware, millet food exhibition, tamizhar traditional exhibition are organised to stimulate the unrevealed competence of the students.

Enabling Social Competence To sensitize the students and to contribute to the environmental concerns, the college undertakes plantation drives and cleanliness drives, many of which are in collaboration with governmental agencies and NGOs.
